In April we completed annual monitoring of our conservation easements. They include row crops on prime soils, expansive rangelands, and wetlands teeming with wildlife. I love meeting the landowners and managers who work these lands. They know the seasonal patterns, the extreme variations between years, and how to navigate the ever-changing conditions to feed us locally and across the country and the world.

Also in April we hosted a wildflower hike at Rancho Larios Open Space for residents. We will extend future invitations to our donors for guided hikes on this 500-acre property owned by SBALT, and to other special events.

In May we submitted our application for national accreditation through the Land Trust Accreditation Commission after three years of preparation. We reached this important milestone thanks in part to two grants from the Community Foundation for San Benito County (CFFSBC).
